<ul> <li>Curricular PE:</li> <li>A new progressive and challenging PE curriculum has been created which links to the rest of the curriculum.</li> <li>New PE subject leader and specialist fitness teacher have upskilled staff, through CPD and coaching, to deliver strong teaching of PE and fitness.</li> <li>Staff CPD has focused on how to differentiate sports provision in school and how to link PE objectives to the rest of the curriculum.</li> <li>Strong teaching of transferable sport skills is now leading to curricular and extra- curricular success.</li> <li>Extra-curricular PE:</li> <li>Sports clubs offerings at Boulton significantly grew. E.g. multi skills club</li> <li>Additional enrichment activities for the children e.g. yoga, Bollywood dancing, little league football</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Increase participation in competitive sports with other schools</li> <li>Introduce a 'badge' system for swimmers to motivate learning in conjunction with Handsworth Swimming Baths</li> <li>Additional swimming sessions to support 'catch up' due to children not swimming because of COVID 19 restrictions</li> <li>Implement, embed and link new PE planning to the rest of the school curriculum</li> <li>Continue to embed the new play equipment and activities at breaktime and lunchtime. - A healthy eating tuck shop has been implemented at break time
- Healthy Lifestyles and PE Co-ordinator have organised parental workshops about healthy eating and staying healthy
- Academy gained well-being award 2019
- New play and lunch-time play equipment has been purchased to support unstructured learning time for the children. This has reduced any behavioural incidents during these times.
- The Pastoral Manager has developed a programme of activities involving the new equipment, during play time and lunchtime and upskilled staff so they can support children fully.
