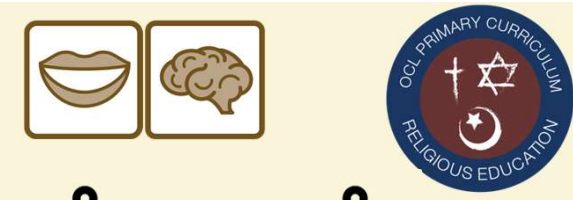

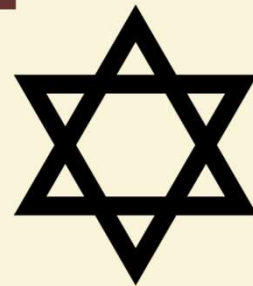

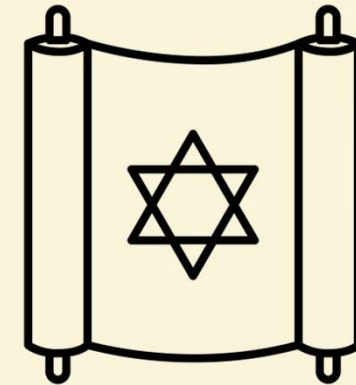

Jewish beliefs	Shabbat	Abraham	Moses
Jewish people believe in one God. They worship in a special place called a synagogue. They try to follow special rules made by God.	The special day each week for Jews is called Shabbat. It lasts from Friday evening until Saturday night. Lots of Jewish people will go to the synagogue on Shabbat to learn about God and pray.	Judaism began in 2000BC in the Middle East. A covenant (agreement) was made between God and a Hebrew called Abraham.	He was the prophet who led the Hebrew slaves out of Egypt. He also helped them form a special relationship with God.



## Previous learning
