In 1631 he moved to Amsterdam and became famous for his portraits. He painted many self portraits. He didn't spend his money wisely and died poor in 1669.



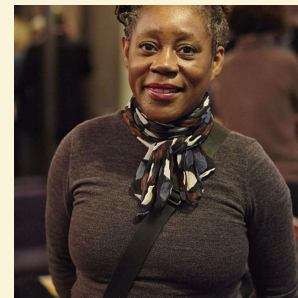
Oasis Global Mozambique - Makonde Tribe Totems

The Makonde tribe of Africa are renowned for their elaborate masks. The Ujamaa are totems-type carvings which show life like faces of people and various figures. These sculptures are commonly known as family trees because they are believed to tell the story of generations.



Sonia Boyce

British artist born in London in 1962. She describes herself as Afro-Caribbean artist and uses bold colours and patterns in her work. She paints positive images of black women and includes her family.



Previous learning

Independent learning at home

- Look in the mirror or take a selfie. Draw your self-portrait practising shading in the dark values.

- Collect information for sketches.

- Add shading to a portrait to create impression of 3D form.

Learning together at home

- Take a family selfie and draw your family portrait using any materials you wish.
- Use clay, playdough or plasticine to sculpt a family totem inspired by the Ujamma totems.
- Go for a walk in the countryside and take a landscape photo. When you get home paint the British countryside in the style of the Great British Artists.



Future learning

- Give details about some notable artists.
- Comment on art works with a grasp of visual language.
- Mark make with the tip and side of oil pastels.
- Vary the size of dots to create a 3D form.
- Portrait drawing.
- Draw a rectangle and split it into quarters and sketch circle.
- Sketching lightly, add in guidelines by splitting the face shape into quarters vertically and fifths horizontally.
- Add features.
- Remove guidelines.
- Darken lines.
- Shade areas on a portrait to create impression of 3D form.
- Include symbolism in a self-portrait.
